EXPEDITIONS

PNWAS sponsors professionally conducted archaeological projects, providing public involvement, including (1) archaeological tours in Washington State and beyond (we were involved in tours of Africa (pyramids of Egypt to Olduvai Gorge of Tanzania)) and South America (touring Peru), and (2) Field trips to visit and help archaeological sites and regional programs in our area (we visited the great YAMA Japanese Community dig on Bainbridge Island last summer, sponsored by Olympic College. We are beginning planning for field surveys in the Black Lake drainage to look for very early sites to test our Chehalis River Hypothesis. **This Spring 2026 we plan to camp out in beautifully developed campgrounds (with picnic tables, metal grills, and room for tents/campers/RVs) by the famous Mima Mounds in Capital Forest Park to do walking surveys in this area to search for potential early camps used by First Peoples coming into our Continent (more soon)**

CONFERENCES

Our society proudly co-sponsored the international **Circum-Pacific Prehistory Conference** in conjunction with the 1989 Washington State Centennial Commission during our State's Centennial celebration (our spring speaker, Dr. Peter Bellwood came from Australia and gave a paper!). In 1998 we conducted a special panel-of-experts program discussing the extinction of Mammoth in conjunction with the National **Society for American Archaeology's** first-ever meeting in Seattle, Washington. In April 2003 we were involved in an international **Wetlands Archaeological Research Programs** conference entitled: *Wet Sites Connections—Linking Indigenous Histories, Archaeology and the Public* (us!) bringing international archaeologists together to discuss waterlogged/wet archaeological sites from around the world in Olympia, Washington.
